

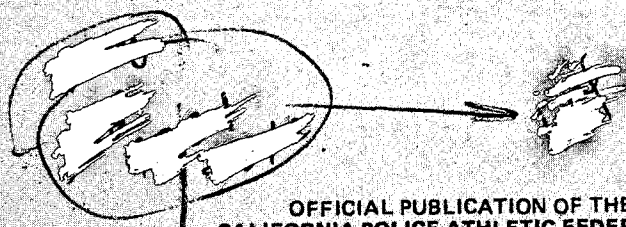

CALIFORNIA POLICE ATHLETIC FEDERATION

What is the California Police Athletic Federation (CPAF)?

The California Police Athletic Federation is a non-profit corporation composed of eight members of the Board of Directors, representing all sections of the State of California. The State has been divided into four sections so that representation can be had from officers living in the section he represents.

Who are the Directors?

Duke is the founder of the California Police Olympics, coordinating the first games in 1967 in San Diego. He is a founding member of the CPAF and is the first president of the newly-formed National Police Athletic Federation. Duke's family consists of his wife Mary Towns and three grown boys, Erich, Mark, and Philip. Duke has been with the San Diego Police Department for 22 years.

Archery is Duke's main athletic interest. He won his first Police Olympic gold medal in 1977, but has five silver, including one from the 1974 International Police Olympics, and three bronze medals. He began his archery career in 1950 at Arizona State University in Tempe, Arizona, where he still retains archery records. Duke runs for physical conditioning and was on the second place Masters 400 Meter Relay Team this year.

Bill has been with the San Diego Sheriff's Department since 1960 and currently serves with the Helicopter Unit. His family consists of his wife Pat. Bowling is Bill's specialty. He has competed in the Police Olympics since its inception in 1967 and has won medals in both bowling and swimming. In addition to the Police Olympics, Bill has many tournament wins to his credit and has many trophies

to prove it. Bill is one of the founders of the CPAF and is currently serving as Vice President. He will be the coordinator of the International Police Olympics in San Diego in 1978. Bill has been active in PORAC and is a former director. He is now on the administrative committee of the Legal Defense Fund. Bill is a Korean veteran, having served with the U.S. Navy.

Lee is in charge of physical training with the LASD Academy. He is a 24-year veteran with that department, having joined in 1953. Lee and his wife Robbie have two daughters, Kim (23) and Sherry (25), and three grandchildren. Robbie is active in Real Estate sales. Lee entered his first Police Olympics in 1968 and became a Director of the CPAF in 1974. Since then, he has won gold medals in the Masters Mile, 4-mile, 6-mile, Marathon, and Mile Relay. His 19 team still holds the record for the mile relay. Lee has silver medals for Handball Doubles, 3-mile Run, Mile Run, and Mile Relay, and bronze for the 440 and 3-mile Runs.

Other accomplishments claimed by Lee Stahl are a National Masters AAU Marathon time of 2:51 hours; a 3rd place National 10 km run in 33:17 minutes; member of the LASD Long Beach-to-San Diego Relay Team; and played baseball with the Corpus Christi, Texas, team of the Cleveland Indian chain. Bob is a new director on the Board of the CPAF, having been approved in 1976 following the Police Olympics in San Jose, which he coordinated. Linda Gisburne, Bob's wife, was very active in assisting Bob in 1976 and continues her active involvement. Bob is assigned to investigations with the San Jose Police Department and has medaled in bowling and swimming. It is anticipated that his addition to the CPAF Board of Directors will be very important to its continued success.

Denny will be missed by the CPAF Board. Since 1967, he has dedicated himself to police sports and has been a member of the Board for two very short years, but within that time has done an outstanding job for our State athletes. His personality has always been a binding fiber through our tough times in the building of California Police Olympics.

CPAF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

During the 1976 California Police Olympics held in San Jose, the Board of Directors of the CPAF became known to many for the first time. The Directors realized that as the Police Olympics continued to grow, more and more problems were developing during

the games. Many of these problems required policy decisions to be made by this group rather than the host agency.

A Federation room was opened and manned by one or more of the Directors each day. Questions were answered, protests received and acted upon, and in general, the Board members tried to be of service to anyone who stopped by.

This year in Santa Ana, a Federation room was again opened and, in addition to answering questions, receiving complaints and protests, we received the results directly from the event coordinators. The purpose of receiving results in this manner was to mail to those participants who had signed up to receive them and, for the first time, to publish a CPAF newsletter; this publication is the result.

When was the Federation Founded?

The CPAF was founded in 1968, shortly after the first Police Olympics were held in San Diego. A meeting was held at the Los Angeles Police Academy and interested officers from throughout the State attended. Corporation papers were drawn up shortly after that meeting and a non-profit corporation was formed.

What is the Purpose of the CPAF?

The prime functions of the CPAF are to plan for and perpetuate the California Police Olympics, to encourage physical fitness, and to promote athletic competition among police officers throughout the State.

What Salary do the Directors Receive and Where Does the Money Come From?

CPAF Directors receive no remuneration of any kind. Their contribution to police athletics is all voluntary. Expenses incurred for the attendance at meetings and for CPAF business is reimbursed. This money comes from a portion of each entry fee that is paid to the Federation by the organization hosting each year's Olympics.

How Often are Meetings of the CPAF Held?

There are currently three regular meetings held annually with special meetings called when necessary. One meeting is held at the site of the next year's Police Olympics; this meeting is held to completely critique the past year's games and to give the next host agency

some insight into the problems that can be expected. Also, at this meeting, the Police Olympics' site for the second year following is selected. Any organization interested submits a bid, and the Board of Directors votes on the final selection. The second meeting is held in May or June, just prior to the Police Olympics for the purpose of assisting the host agency with problems they may have encountered, viewing sites to determine their adequacy and, in general, satisfying the Board of Directors that the Police Olympics can be held successfully. A third regular meeting is held on the day prior to the Police Olympics to resolve any matters pending that require CPAF action.

What is the Authority of the CPAF?

The CPAF has final authority in any matter concerning the California Police Olympics. All procedures, rules, and regulations are established by the CPAF. Even though events may be governed by such organizations such as the AAU, NRA, CCA, these rules may be altered or revised in some manner by the CPAF. The only purpose for such a revision would be to adjust to the needs of police officers and would be made with the best interest of the Police Olympics in mind.

How is it Possible to Organize and Coordinate a Program the Size of the Police Olympics Without a Paid Staff?

Only so long as the Directors of the Board of the CPAF have the best interests of athletics and police athletes in mind and are willing to devote the time and energy necessary to do the job, will the volunteer organization continue to be successful. Police athletes contribute to this success by providing the funds for the CPAF to operate. A portion of these funds also go to pay entry fees and provide a team jacket for the California team going to the National or International Police Olympics. It is estimated that that cost for the 1978 International games will be close to \$15,000.

1978 promises to be a great year for the 12th Annual California Police Olympics ~~and for those of you competing in this event.~~

For one thing, the setting of the Olympics in the beautiful redwoods of Humboldt County in Northern California should be an experience in itself. The beauty of this area is unsurpassed, and the plans being made by Chief Gibson of Arcata, California, and Bob Alder of Humboldt State College, will provide a community effort never yet seen in the hosting of the event.

Even at this early date, community groups and area businesses are busy promoting the Police Olympics as "*THE*" event of the year for that part of the State. As a result of this effort, you will receive hospitality beyond your greatest expectations.

For the first time, a university is taking an active role in the coordination of this event. Humboldt State University in Arcata, California, will provide housing and meals at very reasonable rates, and will be the Olympic Headquarters and site for many of the events. Housing at one of the fine rooms at the University and two meals (your choice) will cost \$27.00 per couple or \$16.00 per single. In addition, there are many fine motels in the area for those of you who do not wish to stay on campus. Nearby College of the Redwoods in Eureka will also take part by offering their facilities for many of the events.

ELIGIBILITY

Competition is open to all sworn foreign, federal, state, county, and municipal law enforcement officers who have been so employed for at least 180 days prior to August 24, 1978.

California entrants must have placed first or second in the 1978 California Police Olympics in Humboldt County to be eligible to participate in the Internationals. This requirement includes federal, as well as state and local, law enforcement officers.

Details have not been completed as to divisions/awards, but will be forthcoming in the near future.

NATIONAL POLICE ATHLETIC FEDERATION
What Is It and What Is It All About?

On May 1, 1977, representatives from several states, including New York, Florida, Ohio, Texas, Missouri, and Oklahoma, met in Dallas, Texas, for the purpose of creating a national organization for the perpetuation and planning of the National Police Olympics. Bob Burke, LAPD; Bill Bradley, SDSD; and Duke Nyhus, SDFD; represented California at this meeting.

As a result of this meeting, the National Police Athletic Federation was formed and the following officers were elected:

Committees were appointed to develop the ground work for incorporation, establishing by-laws, and developing rules and guidelines for sporting events.

California delegates Bill Bradley and Duke Nyhus presented a bid to host the Second International Police Olympics in San Diego on August 24 through 27, 1978; the bid was unanimously accepted.

An annual meeting will be held during the second week in February; the 1978 meeting will be held in St. Louis, Missouri. All of the states represented at this meeting have hosted Police Olympic games or are in the process of organizing their state event.

In the past, National Police Olympic and International Police Olympic events have been held throughout the country; however, there have been no guidelines established and the games have been held on a "hit or miss" basis. It is felt that this organization will do much to improve the quality of National and International Police Olympic events.
