order to recognize athletes, coaches or

managers who have demonstrated the highest caliber of competition, sportsmanship and/or support of the United States Police and Fire Championships.

Joe has been a U.S. Deputy Marshall for 24 years. He was awarded the U.S. Marshall's Service Directors Award for Fitness in 2015. He first competed in the Games in 1997 and has competed in the Games for 19 years. He has received 58 medals in the California Police Games, Police and Fire Games, Western States Police and Fire Games and Unites States Police and Fire Games. Additionally, he has won 12 medals in the World Police and Fire Games. He has completed seven marathons with a PR of 2:53:03. Ron has participated in 20 Baker to Vegas Relays and was often the team's captain.

Joe has represented the United States Marshall Service in numerous athletic events at the local, state, national and world venues. Joe has also supported the Games by being an unofficial ambassador for the United States Police and Fire Championships. Joe has recruited many athletes to participate and volunteers to help the USPFC.

Joe's fellow competitors describe him as a tough competitor who always gives everything he has and never leaves anything in the tank. He is a humble winner and is gracious when he does not medal. Joe has two sons and resides in the San Francisco Bay area.

Leslie Herrig is a 20 plus year civilian employee of the Los Angeles Police Department. She was involved in the planning stages of the Los Angeles 2017 World Police and Fire Games under Deputy Chief Bill Murphy. During that time, she immersed herself in the duties of the Logistics Coordinator.
